The facility has recently passed
its final inspection with the
county and is ready to be
occupied. CFH is seeking
individuals who are interested in
being a volunteer to help feed,
brush the horses, clean stalls and
when necessary care for injuries.

If you are interested in donating
one day a week or possibly more
on a regular basis please call Terri
Spragg at 520-378-6638 and let
her know that you want to help
these horses.

Training sessions will be setup
that will cover a variety of topics
for example:

- how to properly and safely
halter and lead a horse
- brushing, picking feet and
bathing the horses
- feeding routines and stall
cleaning requirements for
the horses

Volunteers who become certified
will be put on a schedule and will
be notified when horses are at the
facility and need to be cared for.
Horses do come and go and
therefore a long term commitment
at one time is not necessary.

Duchess's Story

Recently a 17 yr. old Arab mare
was taken into the program via
confiscation by State of Arizona
Agriculture Livestock officers.

The mare was believed to be
pregnant and due to her poor
condition was transported only to
the Benson area. Brian and Stacy
Martin made arrangements to pick
her up in Tucson and take her to
their home.

Our thanks to the Cochise
Miniature Horse Rescue club for
making a donation of \$50 to help
defer the cost of gas for that trip.

Once the Martins' picked up the
Duchess and saw her poor
condition, it was decided that a
vet check would be necessary to
confirm the pregnancy and also to
determine how best to care for her
and the foals nutritional needs.

The Martins' transported Duchess
to see Dr. Boreson in Tucson who
spent many hours examining her
and confirmed that she was about
7 months pregnant but due to her
state of starvation was not sure
what condition the foal would be
in once it was born.

The X-rays taken showed one hind foot just above the hairline had been broken but was fusing well. However from the X-rays you can see the arthritis setting in. Her face also showed signs of a fracture.

We were all saddened last week when Duchess lost her foal. However, now our focus will be on her recovery and we hope to have her available for adoption soon.

Caster Bean Plants Are Extremely Poisonous to your Horse

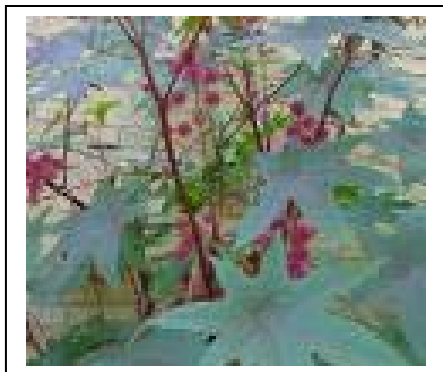
With the monsoon's quickly approaching castor bean plants will be growing in almost all areas where horses eat.

The "seeds" of the castor bean plant contain a very active poison called "ricin". One castor bean seed can kill a small child. Only a tiny amount of seeds need be ingested by a horse to prove fatal. This usually occurs when the plant is harvested along with a hay crop.

These plants will start to grow on what looks like a stem of grass, then it will have a little green bulb on it. The bulb will eventually flower out with a white/cram color inside with a purple edging. Plants

The signs of poisoning can occur several hours after the seeds are ingested. Colic, decrease in urination, weakness, diarrhea, convulsions are all signs of acute poisoning. In addition it may appear that your horse is having a heart attack as his breathing will become very restricted. Ricin poisoning is usually fatal.

If your horse should ingest part of a castor bean plant you should immediately get him to the nearest veterinarian for treatment.



Can Your Horse Get Heat Stroke or Become Dehydrated?

The answer to these questions is yes; your horse can get heat stroke or become dehydrated just like a person can.

It is very important during the summer when temperatures are 95-100 degrees to make sure you keep your horses exercise to a minimum and make sure that he/she has access to plenty of clean fresh water. Shade is also particularly helpful in keeping your horse cooler during the hottest parts of the day. In addition you should also consider hosing down your horse or cooling them down with a sponge bath during the afternoon. This will cause an evaporating cooling process and will lower your horse's body temperature thus making the heat a little easier to deal with.

Be sure to monitor your horse's water intake and keep the water clean and fresh. If you notice that your horse is drinking less water you may need to add a little salt to the feed. You can also sprinkle some bran in a water bucket, this sweetens the water and generally most horses will drink the mix.

Other ideas might be to move your water bucket to shady area thus providing your horse with cooler water.

If your horse were to become dehydrated or become exhausted from the heat, try to hose your horse down to cool him off, try different alternatives to get him/her to drink and be sure to call your veterinarian for any additional treatment that may be needed.
